DEFINITIONS OF HOMELESSNESS

CATEGORY 1 LITERAL HOMELESSNESS

Individuals and families who live in a place not meant for human habitation (including the streets or in their car), emergency shelter, transitional housing, and hotels paid for by a government or charitable organization.

CATEGORY 2 IMMINENT RISK OF HOMELESSNESS

Individuals or families who will lose their primary nighttime residence within 14 days and has no other resources or support networks to obtain other permanent housing.

CATEGORY 3 HOMELESS UNDER OTHER STATUTES

Unaccompanied youth under 25 years of age, or families with children and youth, who do not meet any of the other categories but are homeless under other federal statutes, have not had a lease and have moved 2 or more times in the past 60 days and are likely to remain unstable because of special needs or barriers.

CATEGORY 4 FLEEING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

Individuals or families who are fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking and who lack resources and support networks to obtain other permanent housing.

MAJOR INTERVENTIONS

TEMPORARY

- Emergency Shelter
 - Most people stay one month or less; most ES exhausts at 90 days
- Transitional Housing-Also Joint RRH/TH
 - Up to 24 months or 36 months for Joint Model
- Diversion-SSO(Supportive Services Only)
 - Funds to prevent homelessness; keep persons in housing, provide deposits or utility assistance, any other funds to keep persons housed

PERMANENT

- Rapid Re-Housing
 - Short- to medium-term rental assistance with housing identification and case management services
- Permanent Supportive Housing-PSH
 - Long term housing for individuals with disabilities who are chronically homeless.

- Family dysfunction
- Child welfare involvement
- Fleeing unwelcoming or abusive foster care placements
- Criminal justice involvement
- Residential instability and economic hardship
- Disconnection from support networks
